## What to Bring with you

The campsite grounds are lit only by solar lights so a **torch is essential** for extra light when walking around the site at night.

If you want to charge your mobile phone or camera during the day, please bring a **charger that works off a USB or 12 volt cigarette lighter socket**. Mains power is available for a couple of hours each evening to re-charge devices.

Swimming in the bay and out into the open sea is glorious if you pick the right spots but access is often rocky and sometimes dotted with spiky sea anemones so **plastic swimming shoes** are advisable.

It gets very hot in the summer. Typical temperature in May & June is 25-35°C, July & August can reach 40°C and September is usually between 20-30°C. So don't forget your **high factor sun protection**. Sunhats are also a good idea, especially on boat trips when you don't realise how hot you're getting and shading your head and neck is important.

Even when it's really hot, the nights on the campsite can be cooler. It's a refreshing drop in temperature that we appreciate, whilst folks in the old town of stone and concrete melt at night! You may therefore want to bring some **warmer clothes for the evenings**. Warm clothes are also recommended if you are planning to visit the North of Montenegro (Durmitor National Park, the Tara Canyon & Biogradska Gora) where night time temperatures can be low.

The weather in Montenegro is mostly glorious but it can be unpredictable, with the occasional downpour or impressive storm, even in the height of summer so it is advisable to bring a **waterproof jacket**.

Montenegro has its fair share of things that sting and bite so bring **insect repellent**.

If you're visiting from the UK and love your English tea, **bring your own tea bags** as the local varieties are very weak. However, there is a fantastic range of herbal teas available in supermarkets – really tasty and really cheap.



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The uneven terrain on the campsite and the endless stone steps and cobbled streets in towns means comfy, **supportive footwear** is essential (unless you are a local – watch in wonder as the women glide effortlessly around in stilettos!!). Whilst we generally agree that barefoot is best, our campsite was established in a scrub wilderness only a few years ago. We have done our best to dig up all the stumps and eradicate brambles but some form of footwear is advisable on site at all times.

Whilst our grey water system can cope with commercial products, biodegradable soaps and detergents are much preferred. If you can, please bring **environmentally friendly products** (low salt content & neutral pH) with you if you can.
